

From the Pastor's Desk

For the first time since 2006 we will gather for worship on Christmas Eve first in the morning and then again later in the evening. This year the days of the month fall in such a way that December 24th is both the Fourth Sunday in Advent and Christmas Eve. It is a little unusual but it has happened plenty of times before. I find it interesting though that this year some congregations have been debating about how to deal with this set up. Should they have worship in the morning and in the evening or should they just simply gather in the evening for the Candlelight Service? Years ago folks never pondered such things but in these days it seems most everything is on the table for discussion.

What doesn't seem to be discussed very often though is the coming of the Lord at the end of time. The season of Advent is both a time of watching and waiting for the return of Jesus as well as a time of preparation for the celebration of the Nativity, the birth of Jesus at Christmas. Needless to say no matter how hard we might try the main focus remains on the celebration of Christmas. Now there is nothing wrong with that one bit. However we have been called by Jesus in the Gospel to prepare our hearts, minds, bodies, and souls for his long anticipated and hoped for triumphant return.

Throughout these days of Advent preparation and Christmas celebrating perhaps we can set aside some time to reflect upon how we are to prepare for the coming of Jesus at the end of the age. This may be a challenge what with all the festivities and merriment taking place but it really could be good for our spiritual and devotional life. Maybe this year the contemplative and thought provoking nature of our Sunday and Wednesday worship in Advent will allow and encourage us to take a fresh look at how our preparations for the last day are going. If so you may be surprised to see how this renewed focus on Christ's return might actually enhance your celebration of His birth at Christmas.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

"Why Did the Chicken Cross the Road? Or everything changes...."

As we moved from November to December, we also ended the liturgical year and started a new year at the beginning of Advent on December 3rd. Colors in the church change from green to blue. Blue is the color of hope. The season of Advent is not a season of rest as we might wish, but is full of opportunities to worship and share our thoughts as we prepare for the celebration of the birth of our Lord on Christmas.

We will start December with a "Bless the Needy" event given by Many Helping Hands on Saturday, December 2nd. They are requesting clothing items that are new or that have been gently worn for those in need.

This will be followed by the "Elders Annual Dinner" on Sunday December 3rd. After dinner we will have an opportunity to sing Christmas carols.

On the Wednesdays of December 6, 13 and 20 supper will be served beginning at 5:30 followed by Advent Vespers at 7:00 PM.

On Christmas Eve we change the color of the church from blue to white. White calls to mind the purity of the newborn Christ, and our light and joy in Him.

With Christmas Eve falling on Sunday, we will have the opportunity to celebrate both at the regular worship service at 9:00 AM and then gather again to celebrate the great anticipation of Christ's birth on Christmas with our annual Christmas Eve candle light service. The service is open to all with plenty of music and time for quiet reflection about Christmas and its meaning individually. The Christmas Eve Service will start at 7:00 PM.

Christmas Day service will be held at 10:00AM.

We start the new calendar year with the installation of a new council and board of Elders on January 14, 2018. With the new Church Council and Board of Elders, I am confident that this new Church Council and Elders will provide guidance for the congregation through 2018.

Starting on January 14th, we change colors again as we move from the Christmas Season to Epiphany which is accented by green - a symbol of growth. It is a time for growth in every Christian as we start anticipating traveling toward Lent.

Now on a personal note.... With the start of the New Year, it is time to "Cross the Road because Everything Changes." As 2018 begins, we will have a new President and Church Council leading Good Shepherd through the upcoming year. I know that they will do a great job with the continued support from the congregation. I know that I will be doing my part to support their efforts...

This is the last letter that I will be writing for the "Fold" as my term of office ends. I am confident that Art will share his thoughts with us in the upcoming months.

ITEMS THAT ARE ESPECIALLY NEEDED ARE GENTLY USED BLANKETS; SLEEPING BAGS; BACKPACKS; WARM CLOTHING; SHOES/BOOTS; COATS; GLOVES; SOCKS; UNDERWEAR; HATS/SCARVES AND HAND/FOOT/BODY WARMERS. ALSO NEEDED ARE HYGIENE ITEMS.

ON-GOING FOOD & HYGIENE ITEMS AND SUPPLIES NEEDED

Bottled water, Vienna sausage, tuna packets, pudding, fruit cups, fruit snack packets or fresh fruit, granola bars, cheese/peanut butter crackers, individual peanut/chip packets, other snack items like individual cookie packs, juice boxes and anything else that you think would be great for a sack lunch kit. Boxes of plastic ware (forks, knives, spoons), napkins and brown paper sacks. Additional needs are for men's and women's razors; shave cream; deodorant; toothbrushes and small toothpaste; combs; mouth wash; shampoo; soap; band aids; men's and women's socks and men's size medium underwear.

Great news! According to the most recent LWR tracker system report, at least some of our quilts were recently shipped to Georgia, a country located where Europe meets Asia, in what used to be part of the Soviet Union. Our school kits were

shipped to Bosnia, a country located on the Adriatic Sea, which is struggling to recover from years of war. It is exciting to see the final home of the fruits of our labor which are touching so many lives across the globe. This is a wonderful example of "God's Work, Our Hands!"

We truly appreciate those of you who stepped up to the plate to purchase the final supplies we were lacking! We are now able to fill all 63 school bags which are currently in some stage of production. As previously noted, this is very significant, because these school kits fill a critical need in many impoverished countries. In addition to these kits, we currently have 55 quilts in some stage of production! We are truly on track to exceed our expectations!

We meet in the quilting room on the first and third Mondays of the month from 10:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. and will resume meeting Wednesday evenings from 7:15 – 8:30 in January 2018.
